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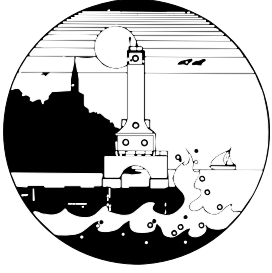

SUBJECT: 2005 ANNUAL REPORT

The Annual Report for the City of Port Washington Police Department covering the period of January 1, 2005, through December 31, 2005, is hereby submitted for your review.

Throughout 2005 the Port Washington Police Department continued to experience change in the areas of personnel, technology, and equipment. Mobile Data Terminals were installed in the squad cars. This enables officers to run vehicle record checks and driver's license records from their squad cars. Taser units were purchased this year. Training on the use of Tasers will begin in early 2006.

Focus Groups were identified and implemented to allow for employee participation and decision-making in driving change.

The Uniform Committees made suggestions to change the uniforms of the officers and support staff. The support staff began wearing new uniforms in early October.

Officers began wearing new uniforms in November with the changeover completed by January 31, 2006.

The Awards Committee recommended a Service Awards Program which has been implemented. Service awards will be given to each employee at five-year intervals. A gift certificate to a local business will be given to employees when they reach their 5th, 10th, 15th, 20th, etc. anniversaries. The employees who celebrate such an anniversary during the year will be recognized at the annual Christmas lunch.

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In fall of 2005, we began holding roll call at the start of every shift. Several work schedules were tried during the latter part of the year. Officers agreed upon working 6a-2p, 2p-10p, 10p-6a shifts. Dispatchers voted to work 7a-3p, 3p-11p, 11p-7a shifts.

The department engaged in a proactive tactical deployment program designed to

prevent business armed robberies. This program ran from November 21, 2005 to January 15, 2006 and had three components:

- Education for business
- Directed patrols by officers
- Strategic placement of resources

It was very successful and welcomed by the business community.

A business plan with a customer service emphasis was developed. This plan emphasizes the department goals, action plan and initiatives for the next three years.

Cost effective principles usually associated with private business are being adopted and applied to the delivery of police services with the following elements:

- Customer Service
- Performance measurements and quality control
- Greater efficiency (doing the job right the first time, every time)
- Goal setting that leads to real work process improvements

We continue to maintain a website and email. Our Website Address is: www.pwpd.org. Our email is pwpd@pwpd.org.

The police department appreciates the donation of resources such as a Chevy Blazer donated by Ernie von Schledorn for use as the department D.A.R.E. vehicle in the department. In addition, the department uses a police mountain bike provided by Pedal Moraine Cycle & Fitness of West Bend during the summer months for various patrols. The department also has had at its disposal a Yamaha scooter, which is used for various types of patrol especially in the lakefront area, compliments of Yamaha of Port Washington, Inc. The department also uses a Harley-Davidson police motorcycle for traffic enforcement and patrol provided by Harley-Davidson Corporation and Suburban Motors of Thiensville. This vehicle is replaced annually by Suburban Motors.

In 2005 the Port Washington Kiwanis and the Port Washington Lions Club generously donated funds for Brewer baseball and Green Bay Packer football cards for distribution to the children in the community. Both of these programs continue to be very popular with the children.

Hunter Safety Education Classes were again offered in 2005. Approximately fifty students attended this very popular program.

We also offered our second Safe Boating Course in 2005. Twenty-two students graduated. Officers Kurt Knowski and Jerry Nye were the certified boat safety instructors. We plan to offer this popular class on an annual basis.

Mid-Moraine Municipal Court continues to be a valuable asset for the City of Port Washington. All ordinance violation cases are efficiently handled by municipal court and help to improve the quality of life in our community. In 2005 we saw the election of John Grundahl to the position of judge for municipal court.

The department remains committed to working proactively and in close partnership with the community and its residents. We strive to provide high quality professional and innovative police services to all. The department is dedicated to promoting and maintaining a sense of safety, security, stability, and peace of mind within the City of Port Washington. We strive to be both sensitive and responsive to community challenges and concerns. Our efforts to improve and expand upon our community programs continue.

I am grateful for the cooperation and support the Commission has given me and the trust and confidence you have placed in this department and its officers.

INTOXIMETER REPORT

The Port Washington Police Department is equipped with an Intoximeter. The Intoximeter represents the latest in breath alcohol analysis technology. The State of Wisconsin continues to maintain the equipment with a technician regularly visiting each test site performing routine maintenance and testing of the equipment.

The present Intoximeter is computer based and is electronically linked to the Wisconsin Bureau of Transportation. This link provides direct arrest and test data transfer to the Bureau of Transportation.

Officer Kajtna has been trained and certified by the State of Wisconsin as a Standardized Field Sobriety instructor since 1994. Officer Kajtna is available to train and certify our own officers in the Standardized Field Sobriety Testing (SFST) techniques and to assist other departments with their sobriety testing training needs.

As always, the Port Washington Police Department stands ready to cooperate with other area departments in every way possible to supply both Intoximeter operators and equipment as needed.

In 2005 the Port Washington Police Department Water Safety Patrol Boat patrolled the waters of the city harbor and marina as well as assisted the DNR and Ozaukee Rescue in the waters of Lake Michigan.

The objective of the Water Safety Patrol has been and will continue to be to create a safe environment for boating in the Port Washington area.

In 2005 the Water Safety Patrol continued to do safety inspections consisting of checking boats for proper registration, flotation devices, both wearable and throwable, proper gas tank, and battery storage. The Water Safety Patrol continued to enforce the boating laws concerning "Slow-No Wake," lighting violations, and other public safety issues, taking enforcement action when necessary.

In 2005 we offered our second safe boating course. Officer Kurt Knowski and Officer Jerry Nye, who are trained certified instructors, taught the class. Presenting this training to the public will further enhance the patrol's dedication to boating safety.

The Port Washington Marina has become a safer harbor because the Port Washington Water Safety Patrol has established a deterrent through its presence.

As always the Patrol Group stands ready to assist the U.S. Coast Guard, Ozaukee County Sheriffs Department, and any other governmental agency that may need assistance at any time.

The Port Washington Police Department continually strives to deliver quality public safety services to the community we serve. As a public safety agency, our success and effectiveness within the community depends largely upon the image each and every officer projects, while representing themselves and the department in a responsive, professional manner to all.

The McGruff Safehouse Program originally began in 1988. While it remains a successful program, it's hoped that we'll be able to update and expand the program in the near future. Originally there were approximately 100 households participating in the program. Participating residents are trained to provide a temporary safe haven for children who may discover that they're lost, have been followed, injured, or are in need of any type of assistance while traveling through or playing in a neighborhood.

STATEMENT OF FUTURE CONSIDERATIONS

With the city positioning itself for significant growth over the next five years, we will need to look at what services are the most important to provide through public funding and what services can be outsourced. We will also need to study alternative delivery systems to keep costs down. Community Oriented Policing Problem Solving will play a significant role to keep the quality of life as it exists now.

Decentralized decision making within the police department and allowing for employee involvement will be important to support the effort. In addition we need to start the process of evaluating the type and number of resources that are needed for the future i.e., police officers, community service officers, support personnel and technology.

As this region continues to grow and develop, a change in the demographics will occur. With that change we must be mindful that there will be a tendency to experience some group violence that stems from the inequities of class, race and ethnicity. Every police department is concerned about violence. Planning, preparation and partnerships will be critical to prevent, mitigate, and recover from any critical incident.

Technology has raised the potential destructiveness of criminal actions. Terrorism and organized crime are much more sophisticated than ever before. We will need to continue to build “capacity” and “operational readiness” to be effective against any potential threat. One thing is clear, to be effective there must be an organizational strategy that encompasses the following three areas of development: strategic, tactical and personnel. The department’s strategic plan will address each of these areas. We will also be aggressive in developing dispersed leadership and shared responsibility within the organization and community while at the same time preparing individuals, teams and the organization for future service to the citizens of Port Washington.
